







Reckoning: a memoir (2015)


With courage and compassion she addresses her own frailties and fears, and asks the big questions about life, about the shadows we inherit and the gifts we pass on.






***Icons: the essential collection* (2016)**

Experience how these beautiful icons help us live a good life, what they have to offer, what they did for Sr. Faith, and what they can do for you.




***Standing together in the community of God: liturgical spirituality and the presence of Christ* (2011)**

Twelve prominent Catholic leaders from various sectors and ministries of the Australian Church offer their perspectives on Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si'*.


With its focus on ecology and creation, this book offers readers insight and challenges us to what Pope Francis calls "the greatest moral challenge of our time."


