

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
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May I walk you home? courage and comfort for caregivers of the very ill (1999)




On my way home:




Into extra time: living through the final stages of cancer and jottings along the way (2016)







Gerald O'Collins, SJ, takes a systematic look at the 2010 English translation of the Roman Missal and the ways it fails to achieve what the Second Vatican Council mandated: the full participation of priest and people. He tells the story of the manoeuvrings that sidelined the 1998 translation approved by eleven conferences of English-speaking bishops, criticises the 2010 translation, and illustrates the clear superiority of the 1998 translation, -the "Missal that never was."



Lost connections: uncovering the real causes of depression - and the unexpected solutions (2018)

Hari had suffered from depression since he was a child and was told that his problems were caused by a chemical imbalance in his brain. As an adult he trained in the social sciences and began to investigate this explanation. Across the world, Hari found social scientists who were uncovering evidence that depression and anxiety are largely caused by key problems with the way we live today. Once he had uncovered what he believed to be the nine real causes of depression and anxiety, they led him to scientists who are discovering very different solutions - ones that work.

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
