

	<p><u>Incarnation:</u> 232.1 OMU <i>A New Evolutionary Threshold</i> by Diarmuid O'Murchu (2017)</p> <p>The incarnation and resurrection of Jesus, writes <i>Diarmuid O'Murchu</i>, marks a new evolutionary threshold and points the way towards the fulfillment of our destiny. We can continue in that direction... or destroy ourselves. It is our choice: to co-create with God, or co-destruct on our own.</p> <p>Incarnation shows us what we need to know to choose rightly. Incarnation reveals how the notion of separateness – of “others” and “borders” and the earth as an object to exploit – endangers everyone and everything. O'Murchu expands the Christian idea of Incarnation to reveal a universal embodiment of Spirit. He shows how all forms of embodiment – from bacteria to the stars, from our children to strangers – evidence a God who loves bodies, and chooses the corporeal form in every initiative of co-creation.</p> <p>Diarmuid O'Murchu is the author of many pioneering books that include <i>Evolutionary Faith</i>, <i>Ancestral Grace</i>, <i>In the Beginning Was the Spirit</i>, <i>God in the Midst of Change</i>, and <i>Inclusivity</i>. He lives in Ireland and speaks throughout the world</p>
	<p><u>Eucharist as a Celebration of Forgiveness:</u> 234.163 MOL by Francis J. Maloney (2017)</p> <p>Francis Maloney's new book is an in-depth study of the history and theology of the Eucharist as primarily a celebration of forgiveness rather than as a tool for exclusion, and the ethical consequences that arise from such a study.</p> <p>The author first tracks how we came to the “exclusive” and “need for holiness” criterion for admission to the eucharistic table. He then gives a summary of how all the gospel narratives indicate the celebration of forgiveness. Next he focuses on the history and theology of legitimate “exclusion” from the eucharistic table. Lastly, he explores a theology of Eucharist as forgiveness and its ethical consequences.</p>

	<p style="text-align: right;">255.125 CAS</p> <p><u>Monks Road:</u> <i>Gethsemani into the Twenty-first Century</i> by Michael Casey & Clyde F. Crews (2015)</p> <p>Monks Road introduces the reader to monastic life on several levels at once. The many photographs show the monks' daily life and the abbey's beautiful surroundings throughout the seasons of the year. Since Gethsemani is part of an international network of over 170 monasteries in 45 countries, some of the pictures offer a glimpse of life in other communities of the order.</p> <p>Part 1 of the book, "From Desert to Cloister," shows how over the centuries monastic practices and the values that motivate the monks to live the way they do have evolved. Part 2, "From the Old World to the New," is a brief history of Gethsemani from its foundation in 1848 among the early Catholic settlements in Kentucky through the various stages of adaption and change that make the abbey what it is now. As the title suggests, Gethsemani is both a location and a pathway, a place defined by its interconnections with people of other places and times.</p> <p>Michael Casey, OCSO, is a monk of Tarrawarra Abbey (Australia). <i>His books include</i> The Road to Eternal Life: Reflections on the Prologue of Benedict's Rule (Liturgical Press, 2011) <i>and</i> Seventy-Four Tools for Good Living: Reflections on the Fourth Chapter of Benedict's Rule (Liturgical Press, 2014).</p>
	<p style="text-align: right;">940.531 KOR</p> <p><u>Saviours:</u> <i>The Story of a Jewish Altar Boy</i> by Henri Korn (2004)</p> <p>Henri Korn was born in Wuppertal-Elberfeld in Germany, the son of Jewish-Polish immigrants who had fallen in love with German culture. Smuggled into Belgium in June 1939, his survival till 1945 was never certain, not even when in hiding for over two years in a children's home run by the fearsome Madame Jacquemotte, who pressured all those under her care to convert to Catholicism.</p> <p>There are two main themes in this book: one, the war experiences of one young boy; the other, his continuing struggle to define his identity. A memorable, vividly told story.</p>
	<p style="text-align: right;">248 ZEH</p> <p><u>The Between Time</u> <i>Savouring the sacred moments of everyday life</i> by Damaris Zehner (2015)</p> <p>From her missionary work in Kyrgyzstan, to her family's life in an old farmhouse in Indiana, to her daughters trying to rescue a baby goat named Hope, Damaris Zehner shares stories that will resonate with anyone who has stood at a crossroads of faith and wondered what God has in mind for us. Honest, eloquent, thought-provoking, and steeped in generous love, Zehner's essays invites us to embrace our everyday blessings and joyfully seek God's kingdom wherever we happen to be.</p>

Why Bother Praying? and What Are We Doing on Earth for Christ's Sake? This work will revise, restructure edit, augment and develop the early works into a single coherent case for belief. It will not shy away from the biggest challenges to faith inside and outside of the Church, but outline a contemporary and accessible response to the issues that confront and sometimes confound believers today. While previous popes have spoken out about environmental issues, Pope Francis, in <i>Laudato Si'</i>, is the first pontiff to devote an entire encyclical to the subject. With core questions included for reflection and action, this clear and concise book will help readers heed the urgent message of this timely encyclical.</p>
	<p><u>Twelve Little Ways: to Transform your Heart</u> 248.4 MUT <i>Lessons in Holiness & Evangelization from St. Therese of Lisieux</i> by Susan Muto (2016)</p> <p>St. Thérèse of Lisieux's "Little Way" has been embraced by people of all walks of life. In <i>Twelve Little Ways to Transform Your Heart</i>, author Susan Muto explores twelve facets of St. Thérèse's simple spiritual path as a way to personal holiness and the secret to being a powerful witness to Christ in the world today.</p> <p>Though she lived only to the age of twenty-four and spent almost her entire life at her family home and in the Carmelite convent, St. Thérèse of Lisieux displayed a love for Jesus and a passion for his gospel that have made her the patroness of the missions. The "Little Flower's" humility and childlike trust are still powerful examples of how ordinary people can grow closer to Jesus and respond to Pope Francis's call for a new evangelization.</p> <p>The calls to holiness and to witness to Christ can seem daunting, but as Susan Muto--renowned speaker and expert on Carmelite spirituality--explains, Thérèse shows us that they are neither difficult nor dramatic. The Little Way can be lived by any of us, even with what Thérèse called the "ministry of the smile."</p> <p>Muto features short quotations from the saint's autobiography, poetry, letters, and prayers, as well as perceptive reflection questions and personal prayers to show how imitating Thérèse can make us a powerful force of love. Muto also offers practical spiritual advice for those who want to deepen their faith and are attracted to the simplicity of St. Thérèse's Little Way.</p>

Wheatley (2017) Audio book</p> <p>Several years ago, in the face of irreversible global problems and the devolution of leadership, Margaret Wheatley began to challenge every leader she met with these questions: Who do you choose to be as a leader for this time? Are you willing to use whatever power and influence you have to create islands of sanity that evoke and rely on our best human qualities in order to create, relate, and persevere? Will you consciously and bravely choose to reclaim leadership as a noble profession that creates possibility and humaneness in the midst of increasing fear and turmoil? After suffering a family tragedy, Mack Phillips (Sam Worthington) spirals into a deep depression causing him to question his innermost beliefs. Facing a crisis of faith, he receives a mysterious letter urging him to an abandoned shack deep in the Oregon wilderness.
