





**A Lineage of Grace (2009)**

As Rivers explains, *A Lineage of Grace* is a collection of five intriguing novellas about Eastern women, in the lineage of Jesus Christ, who actually lived. They were edgy, daring, risk-taking figures, who sometimes made huge mistakes. Through their imperfection they came to know God and were instrumental in the evolutionary recipe for the creation of Christ, the Fullness of Love. The lessons that these bold women teach are as relevant today as they were in ancient times.

In this historical fiction, *Rivers* cleverly develops action, dialogue and personality based on a foundation of Biblical facts and record.




**The Museum of Modern Love (2016)**

This novel traces the journey of a lost man, named Arky, who is in search of connection. It is a meditation on love, art and commitment. - an unusually beautiful book.

The trials, tragedies, happiness and love of young Dinah, daughter of Jacob and sister of Joseph, are brought to life in “The Red Tent.” Although Dinah is only hinted at briefly in the Bible ( Book of Genesis), the author brilliantly brings to life this intriguing character. It begins with the story of Dinah's mothers-Leah, Rachel, Zilpah, and Bilhah-the four wives of Jacob. The book's title refers to the Red Tent in which the women of Jacob's tribe must, according to the ancient law, take refuge during significant rites of passage in their life. It’s here that they find mutual support and encouragement from their mothers, sisters and aunts.

Through Dinah’s voice, Diamant articulates the roles and turmoil of ancient women - the world of the red tent.


**The true story of love that shook an empire**

**The Invention of Wings 2014**



Kidd is also author of *The Secret Life of Bees*.




**The Memory of Music (2017)**

In 1943, 22-year-old Latvian Mischka Danos chanced on a terrible sight - a pit filled with the bodies of Jews killed by the occupying Germans. A few months later, escaping conscription, Mischka entered Hitler's Reich itself on a student exchange to Germany. There, as the war drew to an end, he narrowly escaped death in the Allied fire-bombing of Dresden. As he made his escape from Hitler's Reich, he fell ill and was incarcerated in hospital before finally reuniting with his resourceful mother Olga, who had made her own way out of Riga, saving some Jews along the way.


**Featuring the 72-piece Orchestra of Ireland.**
